## Who Were the First Americans?

## This week we ponder the questions of who were the first people to arrive in America, and how and when did they get here.

We'll continue on and off over the next couple of weeks to look at slide materials aimed at setting the **basic analytic, theoretical and historical framework** for the course, and, as time permits, we will set off to visit the "Nine Brothers" in the Sonora Desert in northern Mexico.

We'll get back to that next week. . . .

But this week we're going to focus on how people got to the Americas—including Mesoamerica—in the first place . . . and in the second place. . . .

Tuesday we'll have a look at **"Coming into America"** with Alan Alda, and on Thursday we'll join *The Search for Ancient Americans*.

With "Coming into America" we'll first see the **Clovis culture**, the ones though by many to be the oldest people to populate the continent, who moved south from Alaska as Canadian across the Bearing Strait as ice sheets were breaking up. And we'll see how new evidence has changed those earlier ideas that migrations into the New World were being driven by "man the hunter."

Thursday in our *Search for Ancient America* we'll see how newer technologies "are changing the way archaeologists work as they examine evidence that suggests hunter/gatherer tribes [*sic.*] moved across the Bering Straits from Siberia and spread across Alaska, the continental United States and Central America."

And with these videos we'll begin to look at the whole "**Pre-Clovis**" **controversy**—one of the major controversies involving al of North and Middle America (and South America too, for that matter).
