The Postclassic

The Early Postclassic: Toltecs and "Toltecized" Maya

We've arrived at the Postclassic, the end of which you will find to be more familiar than much of what have been looking at this semester.

First, on Tuesday, we'll have a look at the characteristics and diagnostic features of the Postclassic *Stage*, including a look at the great Toltecs of Tula, Hidalgo—the people the Aztecs most wanted to be like.

We'll have a look at the Aztecs, but before we do that **we'll take a break to have some Ancient Mesoamerican food on Thanksgiving Day U.S.A.**—featuring an American turkey, one of the very few Native American foods that the Conquistadores and their folks back in Europe took an immediate liking for (most of the rest of the New World foods they didn't originally much care for). And, of course, the squash (first cultivated in Mesoamerica 8,000 or more years ago), pumpkin (from close to the same time in Mesoamerica), tomatoes (originally a Nahuatl [Aztec] word *tomatl*), vanilla and chocolate (pre-Columbian cultivars), and maize (from west of Tehuacán) are all originally Mesoamerican foods. Toltec and Tula, Hidalgo



The Toltecs of Tula (of the modern State of Hidalgo) had great influence during the Early Postclassic, and were the defining civilization of the era. A northern Yucatán Maya city of **Chichén Itzá** became, in essence, a look-alike sister city of Toltec Tula. A week from Tuesday we'll have a look at Chichén Itzá—the city named after the "Well of the Itzá"—one of the most famous archaeological sites and prehistoric cities in the world.
