

After the exam you'll meet and fall in love with Nan Donohoe in <u>Nan: The Life of an</u> <u>Irish Travelling Woman</u>. Nan will be one of those people you remember forever. She will tell you, in her own words, about her life as an Irish "Traveller"—the people some callously call "Tinkers" including about her marriages, her eighteen children, and her "shocking physical abuse" from one husband. It's a "unique perspective on 20<sup>th</sup> century Irish history."



Once you've met Nan, we'll begin a thorough look at Ireland, next week in class.

# This is going to be a long "week"—two weeks long in fact.

Week 8 starts this week, and Week 9 after Spring Break. That should give you a chance to rest up so you can focus when you return to business after the Vernal equinox.

The whole world, it seems, celebrates St. Patrick's Day on Thursday, 17 March 2016, just in time for looking at Ireland in class. So, **this week, time permitting, we're off to Ireland for at least a brief introduction.** Everyone loves Ireland, and the Irish love the world and everyone in it. We'll start off with an orientation to Ireland, all of them. You will see that with Ireland you will test your skill at keeping the **Units of Analysis** straight. (Remember those from Weeks 1-2?)

# One of the great films of all time is Robert Flaherty's Man of Aran. It's a

classic, from just this side of silent movie days. *Man of Aran* is also a "Master Text" for Ireland and for Anthropology of Europe as a whole. *Man of Aran* did almost *all* of those things "Master Texts" and "Classics" are supposed to do—including create lasting images that become the popular conceptions of a people, and **it formulated the people as myth**.

We'll have a look at *Man of Aran*, when we return after Spring Break, we'll listen to what the Aran Island people have to say about "their" iconic film. Some of the very same people who "starred" in *Man of Aran*—will tell you what *they* think, in *How the Myth Was Made*.

And before and after *Man of Aran* and *How the Myth Was Made*, we'll take a walk around *Inis Óirr* (*Inish Beag* to John C. Messenger) and many other parts of the Emerald Isle.

We'll continue our travels with the Irish "Traveller" **Nan Donohoe** in <u>Nan: The Life of an</u> <u>Irish Travelling Woman</u>. As I mentioned in class, Nan will be one of those people you remember forever—just as people generally remember their first trip to Ireland forever. If you have been there, you'll know what I'm talking about. And if you're going—soon, or sooner or later—you'll see.

If you haven't already done so, *schedule* some serious time blocks to work on your Project. And be sure to ask if you have any questions about your Promissory Abstract, your Working Bibliography, or even about your Proposal itself.

One thing you should already have **started to think about is how you might present your findings**. Generally it is a good idea to pretty much finish your paper before you do too much work on your presentation, but, having said that, it is still a good idea to at least start thinking about what your presentation might be like.
