
### I hope your first week with Culture and Personality went well, and that your efforts "up until so far" have been enjoyable, and that you are enjoying the readings and other materials.







# **The Course: Part I**

Anthropology graduates, reflecting back on their time with us at UMD, suggested in our surveys that it would be a good idea to tie the individual courses in the Anthropology curriculum together a little more. So that's what we're going to do for much of the next two or three weeks, after we finish the **Orientation**.

This will also help set **the basic analytic, theoretical, and historical framework** for the course. This material should provide you with the **background and analytical tools** to help you with **your class Project**, and help you begin to make sense out of the topics that follow later in the "Real People . . . Real Places" segments of the course—a good deal of which will be provided *via* video.

Once you have mastered the basic information and conceptual framework relating to Culture and Personality we will have an intensive look at **a** series of conceptual and ethnographic issues and people from around the world.

## **Your Class Project**

This week we'll also explore class projects a little bit.

Your <u>Informal Project Statement</u>, or Project Proposal, is due by the end of Week 4, **Saturday**, 22 September 2018. It can be as simple as the following:

"For my project I'm thinking about X, or Y, and these are the items I'm thinking about using [add short list]. This is why I'm interested in this/these project(s) [add your reason(s)]. . . .

It is an *informal* statement. A more formal statement will come later on (in Week 6).




