
N!ai: The Story of a !Kung Woman and Latah: A Culture-specific Elaboration of the Startle Reflex

After pondering how to research the effect of birth order on folks living in dominant and a non-dominant cultural world, **we'll venture off to Africa this week and meet N!ai**, a *zhun/twasi* woman in her mid-thirties who will talk about her arranged marriage to /Gunda—at the age of eight. [*Zhun/twasi* are also known aka Khoisan, !Kung, San, and, less acceptably, "Bushmen."]



What is the effect of arranged (and sometimes forced) child marriage on an individual's personality? We'll try to sort that out a little bit after our inspiring work on personality research dealing with individuals in categories not well-known or well-represented in our provincial American lives.

From Africa we'll travel to Southeast Asia on Wednesday, 23 March 2016, to visit a small group of Malaysian individuals living in their own special psychological world, people with Latah. Latah, often etic-ly called a "cultural-specific syndrome"—or "folk illness"—is a psychological-biophysical state brought on by people poking a Latah individual, and by other startling events. Because of this reaction to startle-ment Latah is also known medically as the "Startle Reflex."



As you will see, these special persons often fall into a **trance** and exhibit repetitive speech and body movements. And we'll see that while in the trance state they are echopraxic (involuntarily imitating or repeating movements of others—from *echopraxia*) and echolaliac (involuntarily repeating another's speech—from *echolalia*).

Not so long ago a student in Culture and Personality, whose mother is Latah, after seeing the film *Latah* in class, said "she's just the way they show in the film."

Latah will introduce us to the world of **cultural-bound syndromes**, and the personality "disorders" (etic-ly speaking) that go with them.

And finally this week, as time permits, we'll review "Culturally Constituted Behavioral Environments" (CCBE) in general.

Next Week we visit Alejandro Mamani, an elder Aymara Indian whose village is located in the mountains of Bolivia. We'll look at his world, and the spirits in it, and witness still another reality. We'll go with him as he goes mad, in a culturally prescribed way. And we'll see how his family and friends react to his changing psychological worlds.
