Ireland

One of the great films of all time is Robert Flaherty's Man of


Aran. It's a classic, from just this side of silent movie days. *Man of Aran* is also a "Master Text" for Ireland and for Anthropology of Europe as a whole. *Man of Aran* did almost *all* of those things "Master Texts" and "Classics" are supposed to do—including create lasting images that become the popular conceptions of a people, and **it formulated the people as myth**.

We'll have a look at *Man of Aran* on Tuesday. On Thursday we'll listen to what the Aran Island people have to say about "their" iconic film. Some of the very same people who "starred" in *Man of Aran*—will tell you what

they think, in "How the Myth Was Made".

And after we've had a chance to see *Man of Aran* and *How the Myth Was Made* this week, we'll take a walk around *Inis Óirr* (*Inish Beag* to John C. Messenger) and many other parts of the Emerald Isle after Spring Break.

So on Tuesday we'll have a look at Ireland, focusing on Robert Flaherty's $Man\ of\ Aran$.




