



In Italy, we'll first have a look at some background to the country—or could it be countries?—and then we'll re-view the making of the Italy metaphor—the Opera.



A Re-view of the Readings on Italy

As you will see, **The Italian Opera** (Ch. 19) **as Italy's metaphor** fits like a Fratelli Orsini driving glove. . . .



Note that in our coverage of Italy, we are not only covering Italy and Italians, but we're also looking at **how metaphors are constructed**, and what they contain, and the basic usefulness of metaphorical analysis by studying Italy and Italians. So in a sense we're mixing our metaphors with the Italians. Slide Sets #7-#9 are optional.

3. Then read the BBC article and watch the video (4:39 min) that accompanies the article about the people of Piobbico and their celebration of ugliness.

BBC article on Ugly Italy

As the BBCtravel article "The Italian village that celebrates ugliness" points out, the people of the small medieval village of 2,000 people of Piobbico, in central Italy, have been celebrating ugliness" for the past 140 years.

Piobbico has, in fact, become renowned for being the world capital of ugly people. "Since 1879, this 2,000-person town has been home to the <u>Club dei Brutti</u> ('The Ugly Club'), an association whose members believe that 'a person is what he is and not what he looks like."

Adam Barr, the author of the BBC article, suggests their utopian idea has blossomed into a worldwide movement. (I suppose something like an aesthetic version of <u>Carlo Petrini's Italian Slow</u> Food Movement.)

They have become the center of the "World Association of Ugly People."

And they have been both for much longer than Italy has been a country.




