Slán agat Inish Óirr and "The Mainland"

Italy: An Introduction and Some Background to the Country

A major part of this course is your research project—not just for the points, but because researching a topic you are interested in and presenting your findings to others, and then writing the results up as a formal paper, is one of the best ways to learn things. (Lectures, as it turns out, research suggests, are one of the worst ways—keeping in mind that one must separate "learning" from the "perception of learning.") So this week be sure to spend some time working on your Paper and Presentation. (Remember that your Presentation is a "work in progress" report on your paper.)

This week we return to Ireland to visit <u>Inish Óirr</u> (aka *Inish Beag*), the smallest of the three Aran Islands. We'll visit knitters of the famous "Irish Fisherman Sweaters", and have a look around the island, and "The Mainland", **before we say** *Slán agat* and head out to sunny Italy.

In Italy, we'll first have a look at some background to the country—or could it be countries?—and then we'll have an intensive and detailed look at the making of the Italy metaphor—the Opera. You may remember metaphorical analysis from Weeks 1 and 2, and the metaphor as one of the units of analysis.

Martin J. Gannon and Rajnandini (Raj) K. Pillai, in <u>Understanding Global Cultures: Metaphorical</u> <u>Journeys Through 34 Nations, Sixth Edition</u> (Thousand Oaks, CA: SAGE Publications, March 2015) go with **The Italian Opera** (Ch. 19) **as Italy's metaphor**. And, as you will see, it fits like a Fratelli Orsini driving glove. . . .

Note that in our coverage of Italy, we are not only covering Italy and Italians, but we're also looking at **how metaphors are constructed**, and what they contain, and the basic usefulness of metaphorical analysis by studying Italy and Italians. So in a sense we're mixing our metaphors with the Italians.
