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What is Cyberbullying?

- Bullying that takes place over any digital device like cell phones, computers, and tablets.
- Relatively new and an unfortunate result of the connectivity of the internet
- Same characteristics and traits as in person bullying, except it is through a screen

New ways of bullying online

- Blogs / Posting
- Forms of image / video sharing
- Impersonation
- Technical attacks (hacking, DOS, etc).
- Text Messaging

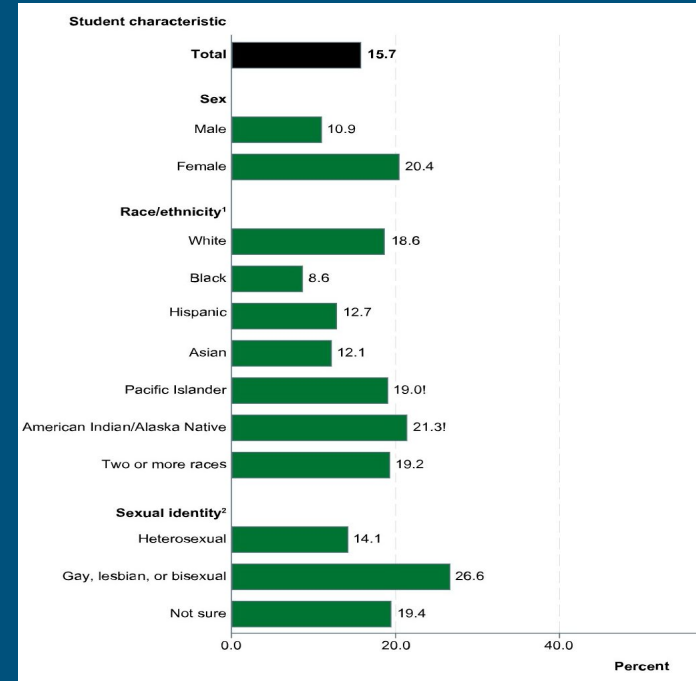
History of CyberBullying

- Earliest Cases occurred in late 2000's
- Megan Meier - Bullied by 47 yr old neighbor
- In the following two years, two more teenage women took their own lives
- New state laws to combat cyberbullying



Who is affected by cyberbullying

- Not everyone experiences the same amount of cyberbullying
- Women are often electronically bullied more than men ~ 10% [2] [8]
- Individuals not identifying as straight are also at increased risk of being cyberbullied ~ 12%



Percentage of students in grades 9–12 who reported having been electronically bullied during the previous 12 months

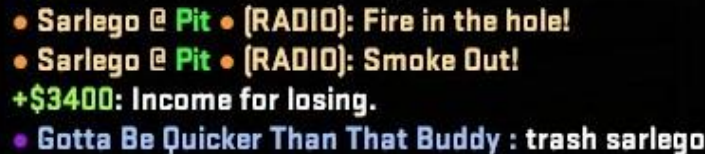

Effects of Cyberbullying

- Cyberbullied victims generally manifest psychological problems such as depression, loneliness, low self-esteem, school phobias and social anxiety.
- Cyberbullying causes emotional and physiological damage to defenseless victims, as well as psychosocial difficulties including behavior problems.
- Drinking alcohol, smoking, depression, and low commitment to academics.

Personal Experience

- Experienced my fair share of cyberbullying, whether it was targeted at myself or others.
- Through various platforms
- Main takeaway: any form of unmonitored communication is a possible gateway for cyberbullying or internet trolls.
- Counter Strike: Global Offensive

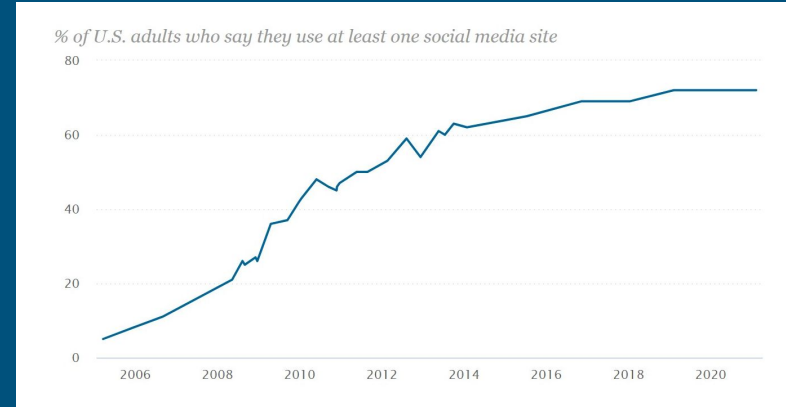

- Snapchat, Instagram, Tik Tok, and Twitter



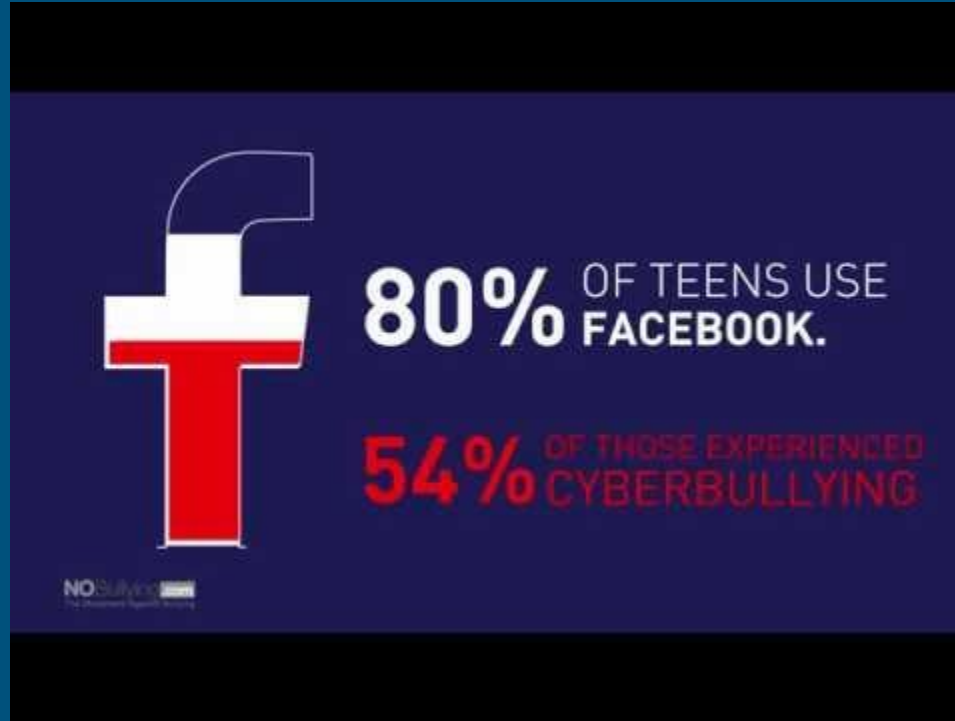

Social Media's role

- Communication and connectivity
- Users share opinions and thoughts
- Cyberbullying has emerged on every platform
- Meta is at the center of the attention
- Two platforms where the most cyberbullying occurs. Instagram 42%, Facebook 37% [6].

Who is responsible

User

- Their own doing, their own responsibility
- Accountable for their own actions



Company

- Their platform, their customers safety
- They provide a service, they should be able to control it



What actions have been taken

- Terms of Service agreements
- Filtering certain words / Profanity filters
- Reporting Features
- Child mode
- 3rd party organizations - enough.org, stopbullying.gov, dosomething.org

Freedom of Speech

First amendment - “Congress shall make no law ... prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech”

- Who has the right to limit speech
- Who decides what is right/wrong
- How do online conversations differ from in person, why set regulations?
- Reno v. American Civil Liberties Union 1997 - Supreme Court declared the Internet to be a free speech zone

Conclusion

- Social Media continues to face troubles
